MORE OF THE STORY

Earl Cunningham moved to St. Augustine in 1949. Because Seminoles were at times imprisoned in fort there, he became interested in them. He claimed he spent time in the Everglades and may have had direct experiences with the Seminoles. However, he wasn't interested in painting their lifestyle with historical accuracy. While the *chickee* dwellings look authentic, the clothing and other details are rather generic.
